Since January, we have been spending some intentional time refreshing our understanding of who Jesus is. We heard the words of the prophets Isaiah and Jeremiah as they described the coming Messiah. Most recently, in the series, "Will the Real Jesus Please Stand Up?" we have been reintroduced to Jesus as each Gospel writer portrayed him. Our last Sunday in this series will be the first Sunday of March, and in it, we hear Jesus say to those claiming to be descendants of Abraham, "I assure you, before Abraham was, I Am." We'll spend some time unpacking why this is important in John's gospel, but this passage will also be a springboard for our Lenten Sermon Series, "I AM: Reflecting on the 'I AM' Statements of Jesus in the Gospel of John."



On seven occasions, John has Jesus defining himself, beginning with the introductory statement, "I Am. . . " Each Sunday of Lent,

we will spend some time gleaning how each of these designations Jesus uses for himself really describes who HE wants to be for us, what his relationship with is as his followers. The seventh I AM statement will be our Easter Sunday Celebration as we celebrate Jesus, who is the Resurrection and the Life!

03.09.25 — I am the Bread of Life — John 6:22-40

03.16.25 — I Am the Light of the World — John 8:12-30

03.23.25 — I Am the Gate — John 10:1-10

03.30.25 — I Am the Good Shepherd — John 10:11-18

04.06.25 — I Am the Way, the Truth, the Life — John 14:1-14

04.13.25 — I Am the Vine — John 15:1-8

04.20.25 — I Am the Resurrection and the Life — John 11:17-26

As was intended with our *Great Expectations* series and our *Will the Real Jesus Please Stand Up?* Series, I hope these reflections on the I Am statements of Jesus, on how Jesus defines his relationship with us, help us to not just know more *about* Jesus but help us to both *KNOW* and *WANT TO KNOW* Jesus more deeply and in knowing him more deeply, to follow him more faithfully as his disciples.

We welcome Christian Aid Ministries **Mennonite Mission Teams** from Ohio during February and March.

We are excited to welcome our second mission team from Christian Aid Ministries in Ohio. We so enjoyed spending time with the group that just left and look forward to doing the same with the new group, which will be here through March. They will be building homes in Washington County for Helene flood victims. Like the last group, the team will be made up of mostly young adult males with their house parents, work crew leaders, and cooks and will have their own Worship Services on Sunday morning upstairs. If you are at the church while they are here, pop your head into the kitchen or fellowship hall and give them a big Tennessee welcome.

We invite each person or family to consider a Faith Promise Pledge for Lent in the form of a second-mile gift, a financial gift above your regular tithe and offering given in confidence that God will supply your needs so that, together, we can supplement what is budgeted for missions to meet the growing needs of those living in economic poverty or insecurity through our Missions ministry. The church will distribute only what is received through this fund. This enables Wesley to increase support to some agencies and ministries and enter into relationship with new ones as the need arises. Some of the ministries we helped in 2024 with Faith Promise Funds were: Congolese Orphans, Food Boxes for Mobile Food Distribution, Habitat Women's Build, US Missionary support, and more. CDG 1 will meet on Sunday, 03.09 @ 6PM.


CDG 2 will meet Wednesday, 03.12 @ 2PM.

All will meet monthly in the church Cibrary.



Two people are better than one. They can help each other in everything they do. — Ecclesiastes 4:9, NIrV




OUR LENTEN JOURNEY



The Social Principle for the month of March is Food Injustice.

What is food injustice and how is it different than food insecurity?

Food insecurity is the lack of access to adequate food, while food justice is a movement that aims to address the systemic inequalities that lead to food insecurity. So, food insecurity is the symptom of a greater problem. Examples of the greater problem include but are not limited to: poverty, unemployment, and low wages. Many people depend on food distribution sites to have enough food to eat for the month. While it is necessary and wonderful to donate food so others can have the nutriment they need, we must fix the systemic issue so all people can live a high-quality, happy life.

What can we do to reduce food injustice and ensure people can have food they need?

Call our representatives and ask them to raise the minimum wage, increase unemployment benefits and food stamps. Local ways we can take action is to have a community garden at Wesley, hand out seeds, pots, and dirt to people so they can grow their own food, lastly educate people that their food stamps allow them to buy seeds to grow their own food or they can buy plants.

"Every 33 seconds a baby will be born into poverty. And 13 percent of American households — over 42 million men, women, and children — are experiencing food insecurity right now."
